Annual Luncheon Sates Mind, Body

Fantastic Speaker, Wonderful Food, Fellowship at Big Event

The Monterey Bay Area looked a lot different 6,000 years ago, with huge mammals, including Columbian mammoths, roaming the land until people arrived to hunt them, according to Mark Hylkema, associated state archeologist for the California Department of Parks and Recreation.

Hylkema talked about the region's distant history during the Pajaro Valley Historical Association's annual meeting and luncheon on March 8 at Heritage Hall inside the Santa Cruz County Fairgrounds. The region had a vastly different landscape, he said, with the ocean 300 feet below its current level. Land bridges allowed human migration and the new residents hunted the huge mammals.

More than 100 people attended the event, including Watsonville Mayor Nancy Bilicich, who also said a few words about the importance of the PVHA in documenting the region's history, and how, after 75 years, the effort was really just under way and more important than ever.

Mayor Presents Proclamation to Honor PVHA

Watsonville Mayor Nancy Bilicich presented a Proclamation to the Pajaro Valley Historical Association in honor of its 75th anniversary.

The Proclamation was given the seal of the City of Watsonville on March 8, 2015. It documents the PVHA's long history, dating to a historical society meeting in the Masonic Hall in 1882, the organization first being named the PVHA in 1940, and even the recent addition of the Borina Archive. The following is the complete text:

Pajaro Valley Historical Association 75th Anniversary Proclamation
Pajaro Valley Historical Association
March 8, 2015

Whereas: The Pajaro Valley Historical Association has roots that go back to 1882 when a historical society began meeting in the Masonic Hall; continued with the Chamber of Commerce's annual Old-Timers Fourth of July Meetings starting in 1920; the first formal history-gathering committee being formed in 1930 by the Watsonville Woman's Club; and which was superseded by the Native Sons of the Golden West in 1940 when the organization was named the Pajaro Valley Historical Association. Whereas: The Association was given the use of an exhibit room in Watsonville City Hall in 1950 and incorporated in 1956.

Whereas: The dedication of the Association's first house museum took place in 1965 after the historic 1901 Richard Pearson home was donated to them by the former Mrs. William Volck and became known as the William H. Volck Memorial Museum.

Whereas: Zoe Ann Orr Marcus donated the historic 1870 Bockius-Orr House and grounds to the Association in 1990, permitting them to move to a much larger facility where they could greatly expand their collection, house an archive and hold public events.

Whereas: A successful capital campaign resulted in the construction of the new Borina Archive, which opened in 2013.

Whereas: The Association continues to promote interest in the history of the Pajaro Valley; it collects, documents, preserves and interprets a wide variety of historic objects, textiles, documents and photographs; provides tours and assists with a multitude of research requests.

Now, therefore, I, Nancy Bilicich, Mayor of the City of Watsonville, in the State of California, do hereby commend the Pajaro Valley Historical Association for their outstanding service to the local community and the world and congratulate them on their 75th anniversary.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Seal of the City of Watsonville to be affixed this 8th day of March, two thousand fifteen.

On the right is an 1880s tafetta wedding dress used by Amalia Jacobsen Myers. This two-piece bustle gown with train is dyed magenta with aniline. There is ruching on the jacket and skirt, lace-trimmed sleeves and hem. The hand-painted buttons were possibly done by Josie Rodgers for her mother's 1887 marriage to Jacob Myers.
